## **Message from the Guest Editors**

Welcome to the JALT CUE SIG 25th Anniversary Conference "25 years and still right on CUE" Special Issue. The conference held September 15-16, 2018 at Rikkyo University in Tokyo, brought together a large number of researchers and conference participants. We are pleased to present a collection of six features articles, three practice-oriented papers, two on poster presentations and three reflections.

The first of the six featured articles starts with, **Tomoko Hashimoto**, who investigated student attitudes on informal and formal cooperative learning through data mining of student responses to their experiences of cooperative learning activities. This is followed by a paper from **Tomoyuki Kawashima** who looked at the effects of awareness-raising activities regarding World Englishes. **Jamie Lesley** investigated decision-making tasks in high-level discussion classes, and **Sakae Onoda** wrote about enhancing L2 interactional skills through pair presentations with small-group discussions. **Kristen Sullivan** discussed the poststudy abroad experiences of Japanese university students. Finally, **Davey Young** described student perceptions of textbook topics in a discussion course.

Following this, there are three practice-oriented papers. Wendy Gough and Kazumi Kato proposed a project-based learning method in a content English course designed for students specializing in marine sciences and technologies. Then, Caroline J. Handley described statistical methods and interpretations using JASP, an open-source software package. Mary Hillis shared selected poetry to increase student engagement and motivation, and presented how to incorporate poetry in courses for academic English.

In the short reports section, **Aaron C. Sponseller** provided an initial attempt to validate a Japanese version of the Motivation to Study Abroad scale using exploratory factor analysis, CFA, and Rasch analysis. Then, **Christopher Pirotto** and **Robert Dykes** described five common mistakes early researchers are

prone to making when using quantitative research methods.

Finally, in the reflection section, **Simon Park** discussed Pirotto and Dykes' poster presentation on common errors in quantitative analysis, and Handley's presentation on quantitative analysis using JASP. **Derek Herbert** considered the practical advice on getting published presented by Melodie Cook. Lastly, **Anthony Torbert** reflected on Kay Irie and Howard Brown's presentations related to English-medium instruction (EMI) and discussed whether EMI is practical for Japanese universities.
